- Building the Digital Library it is a long way to go
- Collaboration in general common goals and joint purpose
- National cooperation and the ALM-sector
- International collaboration organizations and common projects
- Collaboration for development



# A "new" National Library including audiovisual media

- the traditional task of the National Library is to collect, preserve, describe, and provide access to Swedish printed and digital materials
- we also collect, preserve, catalogue and provide access to material from radio and TV, films, videos, multimedia, as well as music and other sound recordings
- We are merging two organizations with different culture and users but with a lot in common



# Coordinating the research libraries

- LIBRIS, the national online search service and the union catalogue for all Swedish research libraries
- Bibliographical service and interlibrary loans
- Consortium of the Swedish research libraries for licensing e-journals and databases (ICOLC)
- <u>Samsök</u> (search together)
- Open Access and e-publishing
- Swepub and long-term preservation



#### Open Access policy for the National Library

- Support open access publishing within universities
- Promote support for OA publishing in licensing deals coordinated by NL Sweden
- Make non copyright protected digitized material openly accessible
- Staff required to make their articles available in open access mode
- Publications from the library as a rule open access
- Use of Creative Commons licenses whenever applicable
- Metadata created or aggregated by the library freely available to use and reuse



# A new assignment – coordinating all libraries in Sweden

- become the central regulatory authority for the entire Swedish library system from January 2011
- develop national goals and strategies for publicly financed libraries
- maintain collective library statistics
- further development of a national catalogue for both research and public libraries
- support development in digital projects
- manage the e-book in libraries
- advisory board influence and expert groups



### Collaboration with public-sector partners 1

- Coordination office for ALM
- Aggregators for Europeana, TEL, Apnet, Athena, EU-screen
- Swedish National Archives and the Swedish National Heritage Board
- Common system for the preservation of digital materials



### Collaboration with public-sector partners 2

- In the audiovisual sector our partners are the Swedish Film Institute, Swedish Television and Swedish Radio
- The National Library migrates huge quantities of radio and television programs
- Swedish Television and the National Library have the ambition to build a common audiovisual archive
- A common film-site on the Internet is created together with the Swedish Film Institute



### Collaboration with the private sector

- agreements with newspaper publishers, other publishers, but also with other commercial entities
- ongoing negotiations with representatives of right holders, organizations like Swedish Writers' Union
- extended collective licensing



#### Experiences from international collaboration

- What is good for the whole library sector
- What is good for your own nation or own library
- From exchange of experiences to common projects



#### Conclusion

In the continuing process towards the digital library, technical development, difficult strategic choices and large investments will be necessary, as well as concrete joint projects, conducted nationally and internationally.
